

The primary purpose of the project is to build the competence and confidence of young adults with disabilities to access independent living and employment services so they can more successfully transition from the youth entitlement system to the adult eligibility system. We are developing an online resource library so youth with disabilities, their families, and professionals can access print and digital resources, along with trainings and coursework. These resources will address seven identified priority areas: understanding and independent living; support for transition and employment; VR better communication with professionals; developing individualized plans for employment; obtaining information about rehabilitation and independent living; transitioning to competitive integrated employment; and understanding the *Rehabilitation Act*.

Region B-2 RSA PTI – Independent Futures that Work



Some of our ongoing work includes:

- Forming state specific advisory committees and a regional advisory committee that meet quarterly
- Gathering existing resources related to our seven priority areas from each state and rating them for impartiality, objectiveness, quality, ease of use, and applicability to the rules and regulations of the eligibility systems in each state
- Identifying gaps in resources

Some of our upcoming work:

- Uploading existing resources to an online resource library (website)
- Creating new print and digital materials along with a wide range of learning opportunities to fill gaps identified after review of existing resources
- Evaluating new resources for high quality, ease of use, and accessibility (stakeholders)
- Developing a plan for marketing available information in all six states
- Evaluating "Is anyone better off as a result of using our materials and services?"

Region B-2 RSA PTI – Independent Futures that Work Accomplishments



What we've accomplished so far:

- All advisory committees have been formed, and will have met twice by the end of June 2021
- Existing resources from each of the six states have been collected and are in the final stages of being rated
- Collaborative relationships amongst agency representatives in each state are developing and growing
- Collaborative relationships among the six PTI Centers have grown stronger
- There is excitement about our project within the advisory teams from each of the six states to see what this project is going to accomplish



Youth Engagement Toolkit Series Details:

Structure

- Developed and reviewed by youth and young adults.
- Each toolkit connects to the continuum.
- It is not a book of activities and worksheets.
- Theory is presented in each toolkit, but then advice and tips for implementation are offered.

Purpose

- To inform the staff that is supporting youth. But these toolkits could also inform your organization as a whole.
- Provide strategies and tips that help to implement or improve youth engagement practices. Helping create programs and supports that are not doing things "to" or "for" a youth, but "with" them.
- To help organizations avoid tokenism and interrupt the culture of adultism.

More Resources are on the way!

- In the fall RAISE will be establishing a national Youth Advisory Council (YAC) that:
 - Consists of 1 youth from each RSA PTI region.
 - Showcases the power of the youth led, youth driven model.
 - Develops materials and products that will support the technical assistance RAISE provides. After all, youth are the experts on youth.


Why call it a sandbox?
